What Is Vertebroplasty?

Vertebroplasty is a treatment designed to stabilize a patient's vertebral compression fracture, thereby relieving the physical compression on their spine and restoring their mobility.

Specifically, vertebroplasty involves a minimally-invasive process wherein your physician injects specialized bone cement into the fracture, thereby filling and sealing the damage.

How Do I Know If I'm A Candidate For Vertebroplasty?

Vertebroplasty is typically used to treat patients whose fractured vertebra occurred as a result of a preexisting disease, such as osteoporosis or cancer.

In fact, as osteoporosis causes more than 700,000 spinal fractures each year in the U.S., vertebral fractures are a common affliction for those living with this condition — despite the fact that more than two-thirds of cases go undiagnosed.

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Patients may be a candidate for vertebroplasty if they...

- Are living with one of the aforementioned diseases
- Have suffered from prolonged pain or mobility issues associated with a vertebral fracture
- Or have otherwise not found relief from traditional methods for treating fractured vertebrae

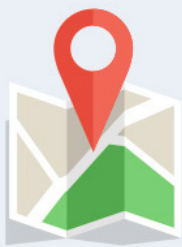
Are There Risks Associated With Vertebroplasty?
